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Editors Comments

This ministry is now more than ten years old and this newsletter now three years. We praise God for the encouragement and the opposition in that time. Many have applauded us for our material exposing obvious false prophets and false teachers such as Hinn, Hagin, Copeland, Howard-Browne, etc. However, when we have documented neo-evangelical leaders such as Billy Graham sending 'converts' back to a false religion, we have been castigated! We have been accused of misquoting, taking quotes out of context, and even 'doctoring' tapes!

We would challenge these people to show us our error! If we have ever misquoted or our facts are wrong we will repent in no uncertain terms. This does not mean that we consider our writing to be inspired, inerrant or infallible, in any way the same as the Word of God. God forbid that we would ever take away from the precious inspired, inerrant and infallible Word of God. This is not to say we have never been corrected or do not now remain teachable. We love the truth and are ever more hungry for it than yesterday. The fact is that the people who we believe are deluded by the issues raised in this newsletter will not listen, will not receive literature, will not test us, and when asked to correct us with Scripture or facts, they run the proverbial mile! Are we really lovers of truth, (2Thess.2)? Are we willing to have our beliefs and doctrines tested, sifted, and perhaps trashed if in error? The answer is yes.

It was written of Spurgeon that many '*followed him with zeal in his assault on Anglo-Catholicism, only to recoil, alarmed, at his attitude to the Baptist Union when the latter body refused to impose discipline. But in both cases he was acting on the same Biblical principles.*'* Spurgeon was castigated in life yet restored as a hero of the faith only after death, when it was realised his uncompromising stance was correct.

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Charismatic Crowds & Controversy by Mark Haville

Despite the enthusiastic gusto of the Charismatic world, the world 'revival' is still waiting in the wings - some say waiting for those who are not walking in the spirit to be moved out of the way. However, one thing we can all predict with a measure of certainty is more adverse publicity in the secular media concerning the antics of Charismatic revivalists.

Recently John Avanzini, a 'prosperity preacher' from America, made the front page in a UK local newspaper, the *Walsall Advertiser*, because of his 'bill burning campaign'. Avanzini's mail-out encouraged supporters to send bills or copies of their bills to his UK Walsall office with a pre-printed, 'PAID IN FULL' sticker adhered to them. The red stickers which came with the mail-out, (apparently signifying stepping out in faith'), would then be burnt by ministry personnel at a special ceremony. A photo of the event would follow on.

The only thing being burnt of course is the people sending him their cash - a recommended one hundredth of all the participants outstanding debts. According to Avanzini, if you have debts totalling \$50,000 send him \$500 in faith expecting a hundredfold return. Perhaps setting fire to his mail-outs would be a greater act of faithfulness!

Avanzini, a featured speaker on the '*Christian Channel Europe*', follows a standard 'God told me to tell you this' approach which, although many would find offensive, works very well with many Charismatic Christians who want to be faithful to what they believe is the will of God. The *Christian Channel Europe* has just launched a fund raising appeal to propel them into the domain of *digital TV*. A recent video is asking viewers to donate 4,000,000 pounds to match 4,000,000 promised by an anonymous businessman.

Elsewhere controversy continues to plague the stars of TV evangelism. *Recently news broke that two of Benny Hinn's staff have died of heroin related problems.* They died in November and December 1997, but the circumstances surrounding their deaths were kept quiet and only known by church staff and those in law enforcement circles in December 98. David Delgado, the second to die, began his career as one of Hinn's catchers, helping believers who had been 'slain by the power of the spirit'. He quickly arose in the church to become Hinn's personal assistant, taking care of his meals, schedule and grooming. No one was closer to Hinn than Delgado. Delgado had just returned with Hinn from a crusade in Jordan, and according to Orange County Sheriffs records, was wanted for questioning by local drug and homicide officers in connection with the death of co-worker Sydney Williams.

It is difficult to imagine how any honest Christian could believe that a Holy God is performing miracles and healings

through these people.

According to Lt. Mike Miller of the Sheriffs Department, Delgado was already under suspicion in connection with the death of Williams because Williams had visited Delgado's home the evening before he died. Williams was formerly another close Benny Hinn aide, taking care of Hinn's son Joshua. Benny Hinn had, according to Delgado's widow, been told by her of Williams' visit to their home the evening before he died. In response she was told by Hinn that her husband was under suspicion because of William's visit.

All this is on top of Hinn's last years major scandal surrounding his illegal employment of local law enforcement officers for his own personal bidding. The Orange County Sheriffs Department, at the centre of the 1997 furore, have already agreed to settle for \$310,000 with those who were abused by Benny Hinn's hired police force.

Enthusiasts in the Charismatic world will probably continue to remain strangely quiet through all of this. Many on the evangelical side of the fence only pray that charismatic Christians will ask the obvious questions that need to be asked, and honestly re-evaluate their scriptural standing in light of these latest events. Of course, none of us are immune from sinning, or from members of our churches behaving in ways that shock or mystify us. But many Christians who believe in the divine sovereign intervention of God are tired of being labelled 'anti Charismatic' because they draw attention to practices which clearly preclude the possibility of the Holy Spirit in anything like that which is being claimed by proponents of faith healing revivalism.

Hinn's latest problems have also surfaced simultaneously with allegations of theft and corruption at Benny Hinn's *World Outreach Center*, as Mario Licciardello, Hinn's former Chief of security, threatens to go public with information about Benny Hinn's financial dealings. Hinn's chief financial advisor said in an affidavit that Licciardello's allegations could potentially close Hinn down or cost the ministry 80-90% of its revenue, 30% of it immediately. The question of course is whether the allegations are true, and if they will ever see the light of day. Hinn has settled out of court before. Hinn's organisation have taken out a gagging order on Licciardello, based on a contract that all employees sign agreeing not to disclose any information about the ministry.

According to recent surveys the public view of Christianity is at an all time low and mainly because of the televised version being offered. Christianity is becoming '*a reproach among the nations*', (Ezek.5:14).

How To Assess Charismatic Phenomena

1. What are the psychological factors involved?

A. Are there hypnotic aspects such as pressure to discontinue the use of the mind?; pressure to yield to a powerful personality?; use of words that trigger phrases?; repetitive music or music beat? B. How much of the worship experience is spiritual and how much is aesthetic? All music has both these elements. However, in excess, music can produce an altered state of consciousness, (ASC) C. How much peer pressure is there to conform to a behaviour?

2. Are Biblical criteria being strictly applied?

A. Are the experiences or manifestations clearly Scriptural? Are they at least in harmony with Biblical principles? (E.g. animal noises and involuntary bizarre behaviour may humiliate a human being and is not blessing but in Scripture is found as *judgement*.)

3. Is Scripture being interpreted according to proper, objective criteria?

The Scriptures used should be in total context

4. Is there a strong emphasis on the ministry of the Word?

The normal method used by the Holy Spirit is to reveal spiritual truths from Scriptures which then leads to a response in the hearers.

5. Do you or did you have an uneasiness in your spirit about aspects of the phenomena?

Your 'witness of the spirit' (Rom.8:14,16; Gal.5:16) is a guide.

Pentecostals Be Aware!

'Some Christians say that the Catholic Church is a cult, others say it is a 'brother' denomination. Still others (myself included) qualify the latter and see the denomination as a Christian church. I would suggest that these are belief: (sic)

* In Jesus Christ as the Son of God and the only way to God
* That Jesus Christ is both fully human and fully divine.
* That through Jesus Christ's death and resurrection we have atonement for our sins and a sure way of salvation.

* In the Trinity

* That the Bible is the Word of God

* If you are a Christian, your lifestyle should reflect that.

Do Catholics teach and believe these essentials? The answer is 'yes'. They do package other things in their faith that we find unbiblical. But ON THE CORE ISSUES CATHOLICS ARE CHRISTIANS. (Caps mine). And that leaves me where I started off - the Catholics are Christians with serious theological problems.'

So goes the teaching of Jim Reiher, Academic Dean at Harvest Bible College, Dandenong (Vict.), boldly published in the Assembly of God (AOG) *Evangel* magazine for December 1998/January 1999.

This above teaching is in answer to questions aimed at a person held up as a Christian academic! Such mis-information does not discern that the Roman Catholic religion has pronounced many *anathemas* (curses) on anyone who espouses the tenants of the true Christian faith, including justification by faith *alone* and the imputed righteousness of

Christ! Pentecostals be aware! Catholicism does not teach that Jesus is the *only* way to God, for they *add* Mary as a mediator. Catholicism does not teach that through Christ's death and resurrection we are *sure* of our salvation, (what happened to Purgatory?), for they *add* many works and sacraments and *never* teach absolute assurance in this life. Catholicism does not teach that the Bible is the *only* infallible Word of God, but rather they *add* that traditions are *also* the infallible Word of God. Catholicism does not teach that your lifestyle should reflect Christianity but *add* that 'venial' sins can be purged in the next life in a place called *Purgatory*. *All of the above is no better than the Galatian heresy of adding something to grace for which the Bible warns of a curse by God himself.*

Only a few short years ago, Frank Houston and other leaders of the AOG movement in Australia were calling Roman Catholicism '*extremely wicked and unscriptural*'; '*A wicked and pernicious system*'; '*Babylonianism is the very root of Catholicism*'; and '*A system that is spoken about in the Word of God*.'* What happened over just a few decades?

What is happening now is exactly that which we in this ministry have been warning of for years! The slow but not so subtle indoctrination of Pentecostals into the belief that Catholicism is 'Christian', although perhaps mildly wonky, and that the formation of a one world ecumenical religion is to be accepted and not feared. **Mike Claydon**

What Is Good Christian Doctrine?

Doctrine is the truth *once delivered to the saints*, (Jude 3). The word 'once' has largely been ignored today. The 'once' has a reference to the closure of the canon of Scripture, as agreed to by the early church, which gave us the Bible. This body of truth is not to be added to without the threat of a curse, (Rev.22:18; Dt.4:2; 12:32; 5:22; Pr.30:5,6).

Good doctrine is not extra-Biblical material that one has difficulty in explaining from the Word of God. Good doctrine is not based on single verses or Scriptures taken out of context. Sound doctrine is not matching a Scripture to an experience that is supposedly from God. Truth has bounds, error has none. Extra-Biblical teaching has a history of being made into doctrine, becoming 'essentials', and then causing division in the body of Christ. Anyone who examines the reasons for church splits should come to the conclusion that in most cases it is caused by *extra Biblical teaching* or *extreme emphasis* in a particular area. We have got to be satisfied with the main things within the bounds of the Bible! The main things are the plain things and the plain things are the main things!

What are the main things? This is the area where some disagreement or disunity enters. Some Christians have a longer list of essentials than others. Other Christians have almost no list and will compromise important essentials to accept almost anyone into their 'unity'.

A possible list of 'essentials' are those beliefs that are necessary to becoming a 'Christian.' What is a Christian? In brief a Christian is one who accepts the *one Lord* Jesus Christ, (Eph.4:5), for *who* He is and *what* he did, and then *receives* the person of the Holy Spirit, (Eph.1:13; 4:4), by *faith* alone. This should involve the following essentials of the Gospel:

- Belief in the *death, burial* and *bodily resurrection* of the Lord Jesus Christ.
- The *deity* of Christ - that God came in the *flesh*, (1Jn./4:2,3; 1Tim.3:16; Col.1:14-19; Heb.1:1-14). (Unless one believes Jesus is God there is no salvation! - Jn. 8:24; 8:58).
- The *finished* sacrifice of the cross of Calvary, (Heb.9:25, 26; 10:10,11,12,18; 1Pet.3:18; Jn.19:30, etc.)
- That we are saved by *grace* through *faith* in Christ alone, wholly apart from our own deeds or works, (Eph.2:8,9; Tit.3:5; Acts 16:30,31; Rom.4:5; 2Tim.1:9; Acts 20:21).
- That Christ bore our sins on the cross and that His *blood* sets us free, (1Jn.1:7-9; Heb.9:22).
- That with acceptance of the grace (unmerited favour) of God we must, in obedience, *repent* of our sinful ways and *follow* Jesus Christ as *Lord* and *Saviour*, (Rom.10:9,10; Acts 2:38-47; 1Cor.12:12-27; Matt.18:15-17).
- To follow Christ is to follow the Bible as the *inerrant and infallible* Word of God, (2Tim.3:16,17; 2Pet.1:19-21; Pr.30:5,6). **Terry Arnold**

Testimonies...A Caution?

In recent years I have become concerned about the use of 'testimonies'. Many sensational testimonies are doing the rounds in which the sordid past lives of those who have now become Christians are displayed and replayed. These testimonies often focus much on the past with graphic details of Satan's world of drugs, alcohol, or other deviant behaviour, and very little about salvation. Perhaps much glory is sometimes given to the power of Satan.

Some years ago when I was doing the rounds of churches with my testimony the Lord spoke to me through the Word of God about spending too much time recounting a sinful past.

A co-worker, Mike Claydon, who has experience in ministry to addicted people, recently crystalised my thinking on this when he wrote: '*...testimonies of peoples conversions are often an opportunity for people to glory in their past, or for other people to have their ears tickled with all sorts of lurid details of unregenerate lives...God sovereignly saves people by coming to them individually in their current circumstances, and for that reason I have never heard of two identical conversion experiences. It is like fingerprinting!...A good testimony might be: 'I was brought up by Godly parents, went to Sunday School, sovereignly saved, and went on serving God'. A bad testimony might be: 'Because my father beat me I became a criminal, after killing untold numbers of people and robbing others, I found out that I still had an empty feeling and shook my fist at God. He then apparently saved me...*

...But you never hear of testimonies from insignificant people, they just get on with their lives. But bigshots, criminals, gang leaders...their was a guy a few years ago, a leader of a murderous triad in Singapore, who arrived in Sydney with this great testimony! Murder, mayhem, rape and pillage - then was apparently saved. He hit the pulpit circuit big-time and we had him come to a church I was attending. Everyone was gobsmacked and wanted to make him assistant pastor! He finally muscled his way into a fellowship and proceeded to split the church. The man has not been seen or heard of since! But what a testimony!' Terry Arnold

Sanctification/Holiness

There are two aspects of sanctification: one is the setting apart and the other is the work of the Holy Spirit. Holiness is God's desire in us. Spurgeon said: '*Those men who despise holiness of heart are in direct conflict with God. Holiness is the architectural plan upon which God builds up his living temple.*'* **Terry Arnold**

Some Thoughts on *Tolerance, Compromise and Controversy*

Today the word 'tolerance' is being lauded as the new way of thinking. There is an increasing plea for tolerance in Christian circles and in Christian doctrine. However, what is really meant and achieved is often 'compromise' rather than 'tolerance'. *Tolerance is to grant the other person the same rights as I allow myself.* If we judge hypocritically (Matt.7), then the same judgement we meter out we will in turn receive from God.

However, *compromise is to sacrifice beliefs and standards in order that others may be pleased and that there be peace.* Yet to compromise with God's laws and His Words is *sin!* To compromise with important doctrines is also *sin!* To compromise with men who are false teachers and who are leading multitudes away from sound doctrine is *sin.* The Bible speaks often about separation rather than unity. *We already have unity with every Christian who has the indwelling Holy Spirit.*

Jesus was tolerant of most people but never compromising. The fact is He was almost always in controversy! The apostles also had much controversy. Paul and Barnabas **'had no small dissension and disputation'** with the Judaists, who were propagating a false Gospel. What would have happened if they compromised and made peace without controversy? Suppose they had avoided dispute - where would we be today?

Those who fall away from sound doctrine are to be questioned and corrected where possible. Paul said to even **'rebuke sharply'** that some would be sound in the faith, (Titus 1:13).

In controversy Paul withstood Peter face to face. What if Paul had avoided this? Where would we be today?

I am wary of *'peacemakers'* who compromise on small things because they are more prone to compromise on bigger things at a later date. Many churches today have pastors and elders who will not take a stand on some issues for fear of losing people or losing their own positions and popularity. These churches (especially growing churches) develop party spirits or camps of people with different mindsets on various issues. Eventually the problem and the issues re-surface in various disguises and leads to division in the body. Unless the issues are dealt with early the split is often worse at a later date.

Sound Christian doctrine is to be defended and will be controversial. Jesus was, and is, controversial. His people are controversial. Yet it is not doctrine that divides but truth! Jesus warned and prepared us for such controversial truth.

Tolerance at the price of truth leads to compromise. *Compromise always lowers the original standard.* Truth has boundaries, error has none. Unfortunately compromise is now a virtue and to many people truth has become an offense.

Is The Holy Spirit A Person Or An 'It'

Over the years I have met many who did not believe in the personage of the Holy Spirit. Many were indoctrinated with Christadelphian or Jehovah Witness teaching.

The plain teaching of Scripture says that the Holy Spirit is a **'He'** by the use of the personal pronoun: **'..He may abide with you forever...whom the world cannot receive...it sees Him not, neither knows Him, but you know Him because He dwells with you and shall be in you'**, (Jn.14:16) **'... 'When He the Spirit of truth is come He will guide you into all truth; for He shall not speak of Himself but whatever He shall hear that shall He speak and He will show you things to come, He shall glorify me, for He shall receive of mine...'**, (Jn.16:13,14). Other comparable Scriptures are Is.40:13,14; Rom.8:16,26.

Persons refusing to take such passages as John14 and16 as stating the personage of the Holy Spirit, are openly denying the plain sense of Scripture. The Holy Spirit who leads us into truth cannot be leading these people.

The Holy Spirit also has a *mind* (Rom.8:27), a *will* (1Cor.12:11), and *emotions*, (Rom.15:30; Eph.4:30; Is.63:10). The Holy Spirit also *spoke* directly, (Acts 13:2; Heb.3:7-11; 10:15-17).

The Holy Spirit is also called God. In Acts 5:3,4 Peter equates the Holy Spirit with God. He says firstly **'You have lied to the Holy spirit'**, then he adds you have **'lied to God'**. In Matt.28:19 the Father, Son and the Holy Spirit all have the same name, (use of the singular).

Some cultists have asked why the Holy Spirit is sometimes called an 'it' if it is not an impersonal force. There are two ways to answer this question. One is to *answer the question with another question*: Does the uses of 'it' contradict with the uses of 'He'? If the answer is 'yes', then the person does not

accept the inspiration of the Bible as God-breathed and inerrant. The more likely answer is 'no' in which case I then ask the person to explain why the Holy Spirit is called a **'He'**.

A second and further explanation is to explain the use of gender in Greek. Nouns in Greek are either masculine, feminine or neuter. The endings indicate these genders. The word 'spirit' is neuter. However the word 'wine' is masculine and 'wisdom' is feminine and the word for 'child' is neuter. In English the neuter noun is used for inanimate objects, the masculine for masculine individuals and the feminine for feminine individuals. However, in Greek the system is different and more spasmodic.

The reason why sometimes the spirit is used as an *'it'* is because the Greek pronouns sometime strictly take the neuter form where the genders of their antecedents are neuter. This is why Romans 8:16 has **'The Spirit itself'** in the KJV as a strict and accurate rendition of the Greek text. Here the translators have gone for the stricter translation to the Greek even though it may be an *'idiom'* peculiar to that language only but not to the second language as translated. The word **'He'** in John 16:8 is from a masculine pronoun in Greek. But the pronoun is masculine because it's antecedent *'comforter'* is masculine.

This phrase **'another comforter'** is a key Scripture to prove the personage of the Holy Spirit. In Jn.14:16 the word **'another comforter'** is *'allos paracletos'* meaning *another of the same kind* - here referring to Jesus. We get the word *'alias'* from this expression of *'allos'* - *the same being, but different name*. If the Holy Spirit were not a person the word *'heteros paracletos'* would have been used meaning *another of a different kind*. *The clear teaching here is that the Holy Spirit is a person and of the same kind.* The teaching of the Holy Spirit is Scripturally and historically clearly a person. **Terry Arnold**

Raising The Dead - The Truth

'Pensacola - Doug Fournier did everything he could to keep his 6 week old daughter alive. After she died he did not stop trying. He packed her body into a picnic cooler, surrounded it with ice and drove 350 miles from Gainesville to Pensacola.

His destination was Brownsville Assembly of God Church, where he believed Brownsville Revival leaders, could bring his dead daughter back to life. Pastor John Kilpatrick and Vann Lane...gathered some staff members around the cooler in the church's sanctuary and began to pray. For at least two hours they prayed to God to bring Fournier's daughter back to life.' (John Allman - News Journal staff writer, as cited in internet site: <http://www.discernment.org/raisethe.htm>)

The conclusions to be drawn from the above are obvious. The above child was not raised from the dead. Jesus was not glorified and no doubt the father's grief was increased. The above sad circumstances can only occur when false teachers of the Pensacola 'revival' such as Steve Hill can say: *'I know that we could all get to the place where the dead are raised. We're seeing miraculous healings, cancerous tumours disappearing and drug addicts immediately delivered'.** The fact is that there is not one single case of a documented healing of an organic disease from the Pensacola 'revival'. The above quote by Steve Hill has been exposed as lies by Christian researchers.

The Pensacola 'revival' leaders have had such speakers as David Hogan, a missionary in Mexico who has claimed to have raised many from the dead. Hogan sells videos telling how to do these feats and claiming that no one has raised as many dead as himself. The Pensacola leaders have endorsed the videos and even introduced the first tape with claims that the dead have been raised through this man. However, not a single proof is given for Hogan's claims.

The History of claims of raising the dead make interesting reading.

Smith Wigglesworth is supposed to have raised six people from the dead. The stories are told mainly by the late Lester Summeral, himself a false prophet, who prophesied that Jesus

appeared to him and showed him that he would see the return of Jesus in His lifetime, and that it would occur before the end of 1999. Summeral died some years ago, being exposed by the secular media for fraud to do with his ministry *'Feed the Hungry'*. The fact is that no documentations exist for the outrageous stories to do with Wigglesworth. Yet millions of people have been duped by such stories handed down over the years.

A.A. Allen, a forerunner of Pentecostalism, was supposed to have raised two people from the dead. This man was excommunicated from the Assemblies of God and in the mid 1960's he launched a 'raise the dead' campaign. He failed miserably and the campaign became a farce when his disciples refused to bury the dead until urged by Allen himself.

Mel Tari, who wrote *'Like a Mighty Wind'*, a book about the Indonesian revivals, wrote of several people being raised from the dead - even a body that had been dead two days and was decaying badly. However, another book was written after this revival refuting the claims as third hand reports or false. The research that came to light was that the 'dead' people had rather been in *comas* and that the local people often did not understand the difference between the two states.

Benny Hinn claimed to have seen a dead man raised from the dead on the platform, and claimed to have it on video. However, when the media challenged him on live TV he admitted it was not on video and that he had only heard about it second-hand. The fact is Benny Hinn has lied too often about such claims.

There are others, (not all of them Christian), who have made similar claims yet not one authenticated case of modern day raising of the dead exists!

The Bible says that some Old Testament prophets, Jesus, and Peter and Paul, raised people from the dead. After this no evidence exists of such events. All such Biblical events were for specific purposes, and these New Testament events specifically pointed to the Messiah - the Lord Jesus Christ.

Yesterday's Preaching!

Tribe of Judah Motorcycle Ministries

Some of our readers have enquired about the activities of a ministry by the above name which holds healing crusades and operates from Brisbane. This ministry has made sensational claims with regard to miracles occurring in their meetings. Some months ago an ex-member of the *Tribe of Judah Motorcycle Ministry* received a harsh letter from the head of the organisation. A portion of this letter stated: '*Only last week a young five year old girl was healed of a life threatening brain tumour and just before that we laid our hands on a young man with a freshly broken leg and he was healed instantly.*'

TA Ministries wrote to the leader of this group, a pastor Terry Walker, politely asking for evidence of these two healings and stating we would publish them on confirmation of their validity.

In replies to our letters and e-mails Mr. Walker promised a video of his own testimony and an '*anointed prayer cloth*' but refused to send any evidence of the two healings, stating: '*We*

do not have any time to go chasing after doctors medical evidence'. When we then asked for the doctors names Mr. Walker then questioned the credentials of this ministry because he has fears '*that we are among those who are bagging good men like Kenneth Copeland, Benny Hinn, Kenneth Hagin, Jerry Saville and Jesse Duplantis and even the Tribe of Judah Motorcycle Ministries*'.

We continued to request any evidence of the two healings. Despite several promises and letters, no evidence has been received of the claimed healings.

We warn our readers of this ministry. Today many such ministries make such claims yet in every instance, when investigated, they are found to be false or grossly exaggerated. On examination of this ministry, we have found their teaching to be false and their claims lack any evidence of truth. We have offered the *Tribe of Judah* leader to meet with us when he is next in our area.

The danger is in opening oneself up to false teaching and false spirits. The Bible is clear to separate from such. We know of many cases of later difficulties, sickness and confusion, because of people placing themselves in the midst of such occultish or extra-biblical extremes. In this case, to attempt to receive someone else's spirit of one who is dead, is occultic, dangerous, and expressly forbidden by Scripture.
