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Editors Comment

How much knowledge do today's Christians have on the essentials of *the* 'faith once delivered to the saints', (Jude 3)? Written tests show that most professing Christians fail in basic knowledge on essential doctrines of Grace such as Sola Fide, Sola Scriptura and Justification/Sanctification.

Many today dismiss 'head knowledge' in favour of a 'run with the heart' approach. But Scripture says 'My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge...' (Hos. 4:6) and have '... a zeal of God but not according to knowledge', (Rom. 10:2).

We are not here advocating 'head knowledge' only, for this may well 'puff up'. However, it is God's ordained method to renew the mind to transform the heart, and only through the Word of God, (Rom.12:2). Today's Church is more often adapting the opposite approach as is used by the world and the cults - it is unbiblically addressing the heart to get to the minds.

The current apostasy would not have made such rapid progress if there had been more teaching of sound doctrine. However, the apostasy will *never* be too deep that 'contending for the faith' (Jude 3) and challenging minds will be pointless. It is vital that the church teach, inform and equip Christians on the issues facing the church and expose false teaching and false prophets.

However, in this activity the Lord, through His Word, shows us that in teaching, informing and contending, the manner is important! Our manner of conversation very often affects the reception of the truth we are contending for. Recently a pastor from another ministry critically wrote to me using rather personal and emotive phrases. Such emotive language may well be offensive and may well turn the hearer away from the very result we desire. If we offend personally we are far less likely to convince. Too often it is a case of shooting the messenger instead of the message.

In convincing, questioning and challenging we must focus on the facts and not in attacking the person. Truth without love is carnal and will be devoid of Holy Spirit power. We must draw the persons attention to facts and Scripture and allow the Holy Spirit to convict or to challenge the person. In all this there is also the need for discernment of timing. I recently listened to a person from one church challenging a pastor from another church about a belief they differed on. It seemed that the place, time and manner was amiss. Perhaps facts were being dogmatically stated instead of questions being asked. Perhaps literature is often a more effective tool to inform those in the body of Christ.

We are to be 'holy in all manner of conversation', (1Pet.1:15)...'But foolish and unlearned questions avoid, knowing that they do engender strifes. And the servant of the Lord must not strive; but be gentle unto all men, apt to teach, patient, In meekness instructing those that oppose themselves; if God peradventure will give them repentance to the acknowledging of the truth; And that they may recover themselves out of the snare of the devil, who are taken captive by him at his will', (2Tim.2:23-26). Sanctification Systems - True And False

One of the hallmarks of cults and false religion is a confusion in understanding the differences between *Justification* and *Sanctification*. Even within Christendom the two systems have become so confused that it is arguably now unwise to teach one without teaching the other. The Gospel is being filtered through sanctification rather than Justification.

Justification is an outside, legal and forensic work of God for us because of the substitutionary work of Christ on the cross. It is a once only past act where the penalty of sin is settled forever. It is righteousness imputed (credited, reckoned) to the believer, (Rom.4). However sanctification is an inside work of the Holy Spirit and is positional at salvation and then progressive, (1Jn.3:3; Phil.2:12,13; 1Cor.1:2). Sanctification is imparted to us from within by the Holy Spirit.

Sanctification is synonymous with holiness and often translated from the same Greek word ('hagiasmos'). It means separation from sin and the world, and separation to God. The problem with some holiness teaching is that justification and sanctification are confused and people begin to strive for a holiness to make themselves feel righteous with God.

It is God's command that we pursue holiness, (Heb.12:14: follow' - 'dioko' - to pursue, press after). Unlike Justification, sanctification somewhat involves our surrender and effort. We are to 'lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us...' (Heb.12:1) However, no amount of work in striving for holiness can ever make us positionally right with God (justification), but rather it conforms us more and more into the image of Christ, (Rom.8:29; Col.3:10).

Over the last 150 years various new forms of sanctification doctrines have been introduced. Many involve a second experience or a point where we are supposedly given a new level of power to live a sanctified life. However the orthodox historical teaching is that we are positionally holy at salvation and then progressively worked out in us. This teaching is not only clearly seen in Scripture but also in various confessions of faith (Baptist, Westminster, etc), down through the centuries. These confessions made it clear that the Holy Spirit and the Word of God continued to give power over the dominion of sin which was broken at salvation and that it was ongoing - there being a war between the Spirit and the flesh. The Westminster confession of faith stated: 'The dominion of sin is broken, though the presence of sin is not entirely eliminated. Just as Penicillin may break a fever just destroying the dominion of a disease, and yet some time elapses before every trace of the disease is eliminated, so it is with sin....

There is a difference between surviving sin and reigning sin. At the new birth we are given a new nature. It predominates over the flesh, (Rom.8:9,10). Although the 'old man is crucified that the body of sin might be destroyed' (Rom.6:6; Gal.2:20; 'destroyed' - 'katargeo' - rendered inactive, idle, useless), sin has not been completely annihilated or made extinct. Sin remains in the flesh until the future redemption of our bodies, (Rom.8:21-23). In justification we have been freed from the penalty of sin, (Col.2:13,14; Eph.1:7); in sanctification we have been and are being freed from the power of sin, (2Tim.4:18; Rom.6:7,18,22); and in glorification we will be free from the presence of sin, (Rom.8:21-23; Phil.3:21; 2Cor.5:1-8; 1Cor.15:52-54).

Sanctification/holiness is not limited to any special area of our life but is a total surrender to the Lordship of Jesus Christ and separation from the world and sin. There are no short-cut methods to holiness! Various 'baptisms' or other methods used to gain a pseudo power and holiness are man made methods to produce something that is already promised at salvation. Such methods remove the necessity of striving against sin by the help of the Holy Spirit and the use of Scripture. 'Be filled with the Spirit' (Eph.5:18) is a command to be continuously controlled ('pleroo' - controlled continuously) by the Holy Spirit. It is not an outside filling and it is not an event subsequent to salvation. In the original language of Scripture it is not a matter of us having more of the Holy Spirit but the Holy Spirit having more of us!

One of the worst things about human methods of sanctification is the spiritual pride and the separation of Christians into 'classes'. Many systems that teach a superior subsequent work of grace inadvertently produce two classes of Christians - those that have it and those that don't. This in itself is a hallmark of the cults. Even renowned holiness writers like Andrew Murray arguably fostered such distinctions with phrases such as: 'Most Christians have not experienced this' or 'Most Christians have fallen short at this point'.

Other systems of sanctification teach we have to be 'emptied' and renounce any effort of our own. However, we are not born again to be empty vessels, but rather the written Word of God 'transforms' (changes) us by 'renewing', not emptying our corrupt minds, (Rom.12:2). These systems arguably also avoid the inevitable struggle against sin and a reliance on the written Word of God. Sanctification is inextricably linked to the Word!: 'Sanctify them through thy Word...', (Jn.17:17).

The holiness experience throughout life is a battle, (Rom.7:23-25). We don't get progressively holy by emotional experiences or any other methods but rather by being in the written Word and separating ourselves from sin and the pollution of the world. The Scriptural words linked with sanctification are fighting terms! - 'mortify', 'crucify', 'strive', 'wrestle', 'fight', etc.

The danger in these methods of so-called sanctification is that it arguably causes Christians to relax in the battle against sin. It is not a matter of 'let go and let God'. Sanctification involves surrender to the Holy Spirit and the 'feet' to that surrender is action. We are to 'present' our bodies, (Rom.12:1) and take up our cross daily, (Lk.9:23; 14:27) and told to 'work out your own salvation', (Phil.2:12).

Another dangerous system of sanctification was taught by the likes of Charles Finney. Finney taught several heresies (see Diakrisis, March/97). One was 'Entire Sanctification': 'Now as entire sanctification exists in perfect obedience to the law of God, and as the law requires nothing more than the right use of whatever strength we have, a state of entire sanctification is attainable in this life on the ground of natural ability.' This teaching again goes against the teaching of progressive sanctification as taught down through the centuries and confuses glorification with sanctification, (1Jn.3:2). Even Wesley wrote a book 'A Plain Account of Christian Perfection' yet on his death bed he admitted he had not achieved it.

Perhaps the biggest problem of the modern sanctification 'methods' is that they detract from the conversion experience by saying that the new birth was not enough. Yet, did we not receive 'all spiritual blessings' at salvation? (Eph.1:3).

May we not confuse what God has done for us in justification with what God is doing in us in sanctification. Let us not grieve the Holy Spirit and His work with 'experiences' that are not of 'the faith once delivered to the saints'. May we trust God and His great salvation to combat the presence of sin. Being continuously controlled by the Holy Spirit (Eph.5:18) is not an option but a command that comes with the blessing of salvation. Terry Arnold

The New Age Movement

According to New Age teaching this century is the 'Aquarian Age' - an age to bring 'peace' and a 'divine consciousness'.

The New Age movement has roots in the *Theosophical Society* which combines religions such as Hinduism and Buddhism and teaches the development of a divine nature through development of the self. Some place the roots of the movement back as far as 1875 when a Helena Blavatsky, wife of a Russian General, taught about 'ascended masters' - spirit beings who could give telepathic communications. Others point to Alice Bailey in the 1920's who popularised occultism, mysticism, reincarnation and the divinity of man. Although the New Age Movement is a melting pot of varying ideas and beliefs it is basically a collection of movements of eastern metaphysical thought systems. It is a westernised form of Hinduism. It has channelled itself through alternate practices and alternate medicines with tentacles that reach into almost every walk of life.

The New Age movement says that God is impersonal or a life force; sin does not exist; and there is no judgement. In contrast the Bible says man was created by a personal God; man is sinful and separated from God; and will be judged for his sin unless reconciled to God through Jesus Christ.

In the New Age movement man is central and 'salvation' is being in tune with 'divine consciousness' through the self. The New Age movement has no absolutes. Truth is relative; punishment not eternal; Jesus not the only way to God and sin is not a recognised term. Despite all this the movement does not reject the Christian church but rather absorbs it.

God hates mixtures. In the Old Testament God brought swift judgement on Israel when they mixed other religions with His laws. In the New Testament '*leaven*' is a symbol of sin or false doctrine, (Matt.16:6,11,12; 1Cor.5:6-9). The parable of the woman and the leaven (Matt.13:33), speaks of leaven being mixed with truth. The New Age is a subtle leaven that when mixed with truth attempts to reconcile man and God; self and divinity; and sin and holiness.

Two themes run like threads through the New Age movement: the 'God-man' principle which in varying degrees makes man as God; and an emphasis on the 'self'. It does not take much to see that these two themes have invaded the Christian church. The God-man principle is taught openly in the Word-Faith movement and the 'self' teaching is taught in the various self esteem and Christian psychologies. Both water down the doctrine of sin and the depravity of man. Both have been added to the presentation of the Gospel of grace. Both detract from the sovereignty of God. Both lead to occult practices.

Decades ago a flood of Christian books warned the church of the New Age movement. Yet the church has increasingly been infected with various forms of New Age mysticism thinly disguised as religious experiences. The 'Holy Spirit' of much of the modern church is now accepted by many New Agers.

The New Age movement may well be a 'sponge' to prepare the way for the antichrist. It promotes a 'Second Coming' in the form of a 'Christ consciousness' and their 'christ' is a reincarnated christ bringing in an ecumenical one world religion and government. **Terry Arnold**

'Jesus The New Way': 'This 6 part video curriculum presents Jesus as you've never seen Him before...'

Southern Baptists & Women Pastors

'Southern Baptists are planning to declare that women should no longer be ordained as pastors. The country's largest Protestant denomination released a statement May 18 that reads: 'While both men and women are gifted for service in the church, the office of pastor is limited to men as qualified by Scripture,' Baptist Press reported. The statement cites 1 Timothy 2:9-14, which says in part, 'I do not permit a woman to teach or to have authority over a man.'...The approximately 1,600 Southern Baptist clergywomen would be allowed to continue to serve, but the Southern Baptist Convention would oppose future ordinations, The Associated Press said. The statement will come up for ratification at the SBC's annual meeting June 13-14 and is considered likely to pass...' (Religion Today, 19/5/2000)

Christian Wrestling?

'The new 'Christian Wrestling Federation' features the slapping, snarling, and bone-rattling body slams but without the vulgar language and sex. 'We do all the kind of wrestling you see on TV, but leave out the parading women and all the negative stuff,' Rob Vaughn, CWF founder, told The Dallas Morning News. Vaughn, who wrestles as 'Jesus Freak,' is a former college football player and a Sunday school teacher

... The CWF, a North Texas group of about a dozen wrestlers, made its debut May 10 before a screaming crowd of 400 teenagers and their parents at the Family Cathedral of Praise in Mesquite, Texas. One match was an 'anything goes' battle between Vaughn and 'Apocalypse' that featured a garbage can, a table, and a baking pan as weapons, the newspaper said. Other wrestlers go by names such as 'The Beast' and 'Angel.'

Fans at the church seemed to love the show. 'It'll get people to come to church more often,' said Stephen Cade, 16. 'It's fun to watch, and it's for Jesus Christ.' About 30 young people went up to dedicate their lives to Christ or receive prayer after the show...'. (Religion Today, 15/5/2000)

The Latest Manifestation

Many of the 'gold dust' reports have already proved to be faked or delusions. 'Charisma' had two samples from Arnott's church in Toronto tested by US Geological Survey in Washington - both were plastic film and had no trace of gold, platinum or silver.

Yet the reports continue to the amusement of the media: 'Brenda Peters of Midland City found a scarlet feather last month while vacuuming the church. Another, a Russel Page said he was driving at about 70 mph, with the windows down, when he got a wind defying answer from God. 'I looked down and there was a feather just dancing on my knee, with this light coming right down on it...'

He has two dozen full-time musicians and at least 20 singers and intercessors. Grady says Bickle believes this kind of continuous worship will soon be the norm and be a key to releasing a global spiritual revival.' (Calvary Contender)

Editors Comments: Without the preached Word of God, true local revivals will not occur, (I Cor. 1:17-21, II Tim. 4:2-5).

Jews Challenge Vatican Over Holocaust

Evangelicism, Sola Scriptura & 'Prophecy'

What are the true meanings of the above terms? We say 'true' because today there appears to be much confusion when these terms are used. The problem is these terms have been *broadened* so much that many Christians are simply unaware as to what they originally meant.

The term 'Evangelical' now includes almost any who profess to be Christian. However, the original term 'Evangelical' was historically and doctrinally synonymous with 'Protestant'. It came into being during the Reformation. The twin slogans of the Reformation were 'Sola Scriptura' ('Scripture Alone') and 'Sola Fide' ('Faith Alone'). Sadly, modern Evangelicals have broadened 'Evangelical' to mean simply the Greek word for 'Gospel' ('evangel'). Thus we now have such groups as Roman Catholics and Pentecostal/Charismatics including themselves as 'Evangelical'. The former violate true Sola Scriptura with another gospel; the latter with the addition of extra-biblical revelations, (such as 'prophecy' as in foretelling words from God rather than forthtelling Scripture). Some have thus coined the phrase 'neo-Evangelical' to distinguish the modern broad approach in comparison to the original 'Evangelical'.

To be truly Evangelical is to accept the doctrine of 'Sola Scriptura' (Scripture alone). But here we come to another problem - 'Evangelicals' today have also broadened Sola Scriptura so much that the Reformers, who shed their own blood by standing for this truth, would doubtless be horrified to see this diluted.

'Sola Scriptura' basically means: 'All things necessary for salvation and concerning faith and the spiritual life are taught in the Bible, and clear enough for the ordinary believer to understand it'. This was not just a Reformation cry but also a teaching of the early Church fathers. Chrysostom in the 3rd. Century, when teaching on 2Tim.3:15-17 stated: 'You have Scripture for a master instead of me; from there you can learn whatever you would know. (1) Indeed, 2Timothy 3:16,17 states clearly that 'All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, [God-breathed] and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction ['paideia' - instruction of children - has a chastening implication] in righteousness: that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works', (2Tim.3:16). The Greek word here for 'perfect' is not the common 'teleios' meaning 'complete or mature' but is the word 'artios' meaning 'now complete, sufficient, completely qualified'. Augustine in the 4th Century taught the same doctrine: 'In those teachings which are clearly based on Scripture are found all that concerns faith and the conduct of life.' (2) Luther once said: 'Any teaching which does not square with Scripture is to be rejected even if it snows miracles every day.' (3)

Today many say the Spirit is working apart from the Word and in addition to the Word. The Signs and Wonders Movement has furthered the errors of prophetic and new revelations, unknown tongues and extra Biblical teaching. A valid response to this is: if these are Words from God then why do we not add them to the existing canon of Scripture? The truth is that many of these errors are often additions to the Word of God and thus outright attacks on Sola Scriptura!

However, today there are now far more subtle attacks on Sola Scriptura. The following two statements will show the subtle broadening of this doctrine. (A) The Bible is the only infallible rule of faith and practise. (B) The Bible is infallible only in matters of faith and practise. ('Faith and practise' here refer to the sum of Christian living and includes all that is needed to salvation and to live a spiritual life that glorifies

God). The deception is in the latter (B) which leads people to think that only part of the Bible is infallible - ie. that part only that speaks to faith and practice... The next step to apostasy is to deny that the Scriptures are adequate for faith and conduct.

Outside of the material in the Bible we are free to make choices one way or another. The Bible does not tell us how to repair our motor vehicle and we are free to consult elsewhere for direction. However, all we *need* to know in *spiritual matters* and matters that deal with our *soul* are written in the Word of God - the Bible.

How and why is such a downgrade of Sola Scriptura occurring? One of the principle causes is that Christians are looking to the world for answers to spiritual problems. Two examples suffice to show how Christians have lowered the original view of Sola Scriptura.

Firstly, today Church leaders look to the world for methods of church growth and hence we have the modern 'Church Growth Movement'. This movement unashamedly takes concepts straight out of the world's motivational marketing techniques. A proliferation of worldly techniques has arguably affected the message of the Gospel to such an extent as to make Christian and non Christian hearers comfortable and entertained. The result is that sin and grace are minimised.

Secondly, Christians are increasingly looking to the world for psychological methods to cure alcoholics, drug addicts and abused people. Hence churches have adopted self help groups; 'co-dependency recovery' groups; 'ten step' programs - all designed to build self-esteem, self-fulfilment and other humanistic and unbiblical values. Churches now have 'Christian psychologists' on staff. This is despite the fact that Christian psychology today teaches people to look outside the Bible for solutions to problems that are addressed in the Bible. Christian Psychology has a low view of sin, partly because it has a low view of Scripture.

What do the Scriptures say?: 'Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ', (Col.2:8). 'In timespast you walked according to the course of this world... (Eph.2:2) 'And be not conformed to this world but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind...' (Rom.12:2). The only means to transform our Christian minds is the all sufficient Word of God! Although there are many valuable things outside the Bible, spiritually all we need to know is in Scripture!

It is not the Word of God *plus* - that is the message of the cults. Spiritual truth to the Christian is found in the Bible. The power of God to live a Christian life comes from the Holy Spirit, but through the Word. *To know the Scriptures is to know the power of God*, (Mk.12:24)!

How did Jesus handle attacks from Satan? - by quoting the Word of God - 'It is written', (Matt.4:6-10). Even the symbols of the Word of God, ('lamp', 'hammer', 'sword', 'seed'), show it's power. 'For the Word of God is quick [gives life continually] and powerful [energises] and sharper than any two edged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul [the mind, will, emotions] and spirit, [the God-breathed principle of life] and of the joints and marrow, and is a discerner ['kritikos' - a judge, decider] of the thoughts and intents of the heart', (Heb.4:12). With the above in mind, do we need psychology!? Do we need Church Growth methods!? How did the saints of last centuries ever survive without such? - perhaps because they believed and practised Sola Scriptura!

The Bible is the rule of God. It has *all* the spiritual wisdom we ever need, (Col.3:16). It contains the *whole* counsel of

God, nothing less, nothing more. For many this thinking is 'too narrow'. Yet God even places His Word above His name! (Ps.138:2) If the Word of God will not change people then forget about using any other methods!

A more modern attack on Sola Scriptura has come from the Pentecostal/Charismatic sector of the church through their understanding of 'prophecy'. Some confusion here stems from the misunderstanding of what 'prophecy' means in the New Testament

The modern meaning of the verb to 'prophesy' has in some quarters unfortunately come to mean to predict, to foretell the future, or to put forth the mind of God. This is certainly indicative of the Old Testament usage but in the New Testament the primary and general meaning is rather to 'tell forth [forthtell] the message of God'. Since we now have the Word of God in written form in a canon of Scripture (4) that is closed, the closest thing to this would be preaching or expounding forthtelling the Word of God already contained in the Bible.

In the Old Testament the Word of God was being given to men through the prophets and those specifically used by God, (Heb.1:1,2; 2Pet.1:21). The meaning of 'prophet' in the Old Testament was that of a speaker of the oracles of God, one chosen by God to speak His Words. Aaron was chosen by God to be a prophet before Pharoah, (Ex.4,5,7). Many of these men had immediate direct communion with God or God chose to communicate to them through dreams and visions, (Num.12:2cp.vs.6; Nu.12:1-8cp. Jer.23; Amos 3:7,8; Gen 20: 7,8,17,18). However, this is not the practice today for we now have the completed Word of God! Today it is surely grievous to God when we look for more than He has given us in the completed Scriptures.

In the New Testament to 'prophesy' is the Greek 'prophetes' from 'pro' meaning 'forth' and 'phemi' - 'to speak': to speak forth the Word of God or to forthtell. The primary meaning of the word 'prophesy' in the New Testament is to forthtell, not to foretell as in the Old Testament.

Even where the intent in the New Testament is to *foretell*, almost all the references are quoting something from the Old Testament, (Example - Matt.15:7: 'Ye hypocrites, well did Isaiah prophesy of you...'; 1Pet 1:10: 'Of which salvation the [Old Testament] prophets...prophesied of the grace that should come unto you.') In Luke 1:67 when Zacharias 'prophesied' he recounts what was already promised and looked forward to in the Old Testament - that the 'God of Israel' had 'visited and redeemed His people, and...raised up a horn of salvation for us in the house of His servant David ... by the mouth of His holy prophets...which he swore to our father Abraham...And thou, child, shalt be called the prophet of the Highest... To give knowledge of salvation unto his people by the remission of their sins...' Again in Acts 2:16,17 on the day of Pentecost the word 'prophesy' here is not foretelling the future but recounting something already spoken of in the Old Testament from Joel 2.

There is perhaps only one clear occasion in the New Testament where *fore*telling seems to be the sole intent - that of Agabus in Acts 11:27,28, written *prior* to the closure of the canon of Scripture. However, it must be remembered that we now have a closed canon - the Bible is now complete. The faith has been 'ONCE delivered unto the saints', (Jude 3). God 'spake in time past unto the fathers by the prophets, Hath in these last days spoken unto us by his Son...', (Heb.1:1,2). To add to the Word brings the threat of a curse, (Rev.22:18,19 cp. Dt.4:2; 12:3).

In the case of the Old Testament, the prophets *fore* told of the salvation yet to be accomplished. In the New Testament,

prophecy was a publication of the salvation *already* accomplished. In the Old Testament prophesying was *foretelling* of a future salvation. In the New Testament prophesying is publication of a salvation in passing.

In Eph. 2:20; 3:5, the prophets were named side by side with the Apostles (meaning the eleven and those who were commissioned by Jesus directly) as the *foundation* of the New Testament church. They are to be understood as exclusively New Testament prophets and are listed in Eph. 4:11 between apostles and evangelists (see also 1 Cor. 12:28). New Testament prophets were for the New Testament church what Old Testament prophets were for Israel. They maintained intact the immediate connection between the church and God. They were messengers or communicators. Such prophets were not ordained in local churches and arguably do not have successors. In Deuteronomy 18:9–22 Cp. Acts 3:22,23 Moses spoke of One who would come and be the Prophet. Jesus Christ was that individual, (Acts 22:22; 3:22; 7:37).

Pentecostal/Charismatics sometimes admit there is an apparent contradiction between their version of prophesying and the sufficiency of Scripture. However, through a gymnastics of terminology they redefine 'prophecy'. They quote many Old Testament Scriptures such as 1Kings 17:1 where Elijah prophesied saying: '...according to my word.' However, what must be realised is that these words went on to become the completed Word of God!

Modern day Pentecostal/Charismatics say that their prophesying is founded on, and in agreement with, the Word of God and is simply applied to our present situation. They say their prophesying is the revelation of God's Word/will in our present situation. However, they are referring in practice to foretelling, rather than forthtelling the already completed Word of God. Sola Scriptura as it was originally taught says that the Word of God is enough and this excludes foretelling any new Words from God. Still some quote 1 Corinthians 14 where the practice of prophesying is mentioned. However, at the time of the Corinthian church the canon of Scripture had not been completed.

In short, people who proclaim words directly from God are adding to the Word of God! They are implying the Bible is not sufficient. They cannot claim Sola Scriptura as the reformers taught it! The fact is there is a glaring contradiction between the Pentecostal/Charismatic practice of 'prophesying' as in foretelling and the all sufficiency of Scripture. No amount of rearranging or redefining the definitions of 'prophecy' or Sola Scriptura will change this.

Logically, anything outside of God's Word does not have to be 'prophesied' to give people direction or to show the will of God. We are *free* to do whatever is outside and not contradictory to the written Word of God. We also have the benefit of prayer and the counsel of many. We simply do not need a 'prophet' or anyone to 'prophesy' such things. The fruit of today's many false 'prophets' and false 'prophesies' should drive us back to a reliance on the *all sufficiency of Scripture*.

In this ministry our hearts cry out to Evangelicals world wide to stand with the Reformers in the true meaning of the word Evangelical and proclaim Sola Scriptura! Let this doctrine not be polluted by the methods of the world. Let it not be muddied by movements that would have an ear to hear new words and revelations from God. 'Every Word of God is pure...add thou not unto his words...' (Ps.30:5,6)

Holiness is an achieved state...God gives holiness with his love. Tolerance is a step to holiness. It was the intolerance and holier than thou attitude that grated on me.

Editors reply: Dear...I am sorry you are 'disgusted' in my one comment from the 'Diakrisis'/April/2000 newsletter which simply asked the question: 'why is there an increasing acceptance of homosexuality?'. That was the only statement made about homosexuality in the entire editorial you mentioned. From my one statement you charged me with suggesting 'that Christians should not accept gay people'. Yet I did not mention gay people but rather the sin of 'homosexuality'.

Unlike you I am not respected in the ecumenical field. The Bible is absolutely opposed to the current ecumenical movement which mixes the true Gospel with false gospels and is forming the end-time apostate church. Some decades ago the bulk of Evangelicals were warning of this deception, yet today the ecumenical movement has blinded the eyes of perhaps even the majority.

Contrary to what you write, Jesus will judge sin including...homosexuality. This sin if not forgiven and repented of will send you to Hell, unless you trust Jesus Christ for His righteousness and His work on the cross. If you have truly done this you should be convicted of such sin and follow His Word - which condemns such sexuality outright.

Yes, God is a God of love but my question to you is: Is He not also a God of wrath? Does He not call for repentance *before* judgement?

I agree there are many hidden 'gay' priests, particularly in the Roman Catholic religion. The private surveys show the percentage is shockingly high.

I have never said I hate homosexuals but rather that

Homosexuality is sin and an abomination in the sight of God. It never ceases to amaze me that we get accused of 'judging', yet 'gay' people themselves quickly judge us as 'unloving'! Who is judging who here?

...'Misconstrued and uneducated interpretations of the Bible'? Homosexuality and Lesbianism are clearly and severely condemned in the Old Testament as an 'abomination' with the penalty of death, (Lev.18:22). In the New Testament it is called a 'vile affection'; being 'against nature'; 'unseemly'; and 'error', (Rom.1:26,27); and this act of 'going after strange flesh' and will bring 'eternal fire', (Jude 7). The Greek word for 'strange' here means 'another of a different kind' and refers to men with men and women with women. Another is 1Cor.6:9,10: '...the unrighteous shall not inherit the kingdom of heaven...nor the effeminate, nor the abusers of themselves with mankind...' The Greek words here for 'effeminate' and 'abusers' specifically refer to Homosexuals and Lesbians.

'Anti - Mormon sentiments...bigotry'? Should I believe in Mormonism when it has a different jesus, a different gospel and a different heaven and hell?

The 'new commandment' you speak of mentions not only 'love', (which you judge me as not having), but also mentions the word 'disciple'. A disciple is one who adheres to the person and to His doctrine, who takes up his cross and follows the master and His Words.

Yes we should be teaching love, faith and tolerance, but not such that we allow for sin! One word seems to be missing in your letter - TRUTH. What about the truth of God's Word? Love without truth is not love. It is because we love you that we tell you the truth - your sin of homosexuality will be judged...I beg you to repent of this and call upon the name of the Lord to save you. I enclose our Jan/Feb issue which features a more in depth article on homosexuality. I ask you to read it in full.

Please also read this letter and the article to the 'ministers fraternal'. I am coming to Sydney in August and would meet with you and any in the ministers fraternal that we might enquirer into God's Word further.

Yes, please continue to pray for me. We will continue to love you and to help you in any way we can that you might know the power of God and the dominion over sin. With the Love of Christ,

Reply: Dear Mr. Arnold,...unlike yourself many ministers of the Christian religion focus on a positive God not a negative God...just because some of the disciples did not agree or accept homosexuality does not mean this is wrong. Christ did not condemn homosexuals. He accepted them for who they are. Editors note: In the last issue May/June, P.7, a subscriber wrote about Gumbel and the Alpha course. We have since had enquiries concerning the statement that Gumbel said 'Genesis is a myth'. We remind readers that such letters to the editor are not 'editorial' and do not necessarily reflect the views of the editors or advisors. However, the following from the subscriber may help in clarification.

Subscriber: Dear Terry, When Gumbel stated on the video that Genesis was a myth, this was the thrust of what he said, not his exact words...We recall that it was about lesson 4 when Gumbel made his statement...We then commenced this correspondence [see May/June issue] with Gumbel. Gumbel stated in writing that he could not remember what he had said on the video. We understand that Gumbel has since altered this video.

...We cannot have confidence in someone who does not see Genesis as 100% true. After all if he does not believe that, what else does he not believe? What is Gumbel's understanding of sin if he does not believe Genesis is literally true? Why did he refuse to answer our questions and refer us to his book instead, which is totally wishy washy embracing theistic evolution and quotes even Buddhists and their beliefs?

In Gumbel's book 'Searching Issues', Ch. 6, P.103, Gumbel states, talking about Genesis: 'Whichever view one takes, it is clear that there is not necessarily a conflict between science and Scripture. In the light of the uncertainty and the difference of opinions among genuine Christians, I think it is unwise to be too dogmatic about the issue (certainly if, like me, you are neither a scientist nor a theologian). The main point of Genesis is not to answer the question "How"? and "Who"? (The theological questions). The Bible is not primarily a scientific book, but a theological one."

I must ask therefore, if Gumbel states he is not a theologian, how is he therefore able to understand a book he states is theological? ... The Bible is either true or not, it is not a dogma to decide whether we should or should not become dogmatised with one part instead of another... His book and Alpha is a type of palatable PR. mish mash that does not face the fact that men are sinners and thus lead them truly to Jesus Christ as Saviour! (Subscriber)
