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Editors Comments

This ministry continues to grow rapidly. The Lord has given much increase in recent times. When the Lord produces the growth, he supplies accordingly.

Many churches today are so wrapped up in church growth activities, 'revivals' and programs that the urgencies and deceptions of the hour sometimes escape the attention of many.

It frightens me to think that many people are going to Hell yet thinking they are going to Heaven. Impossible?...yet the Scriptures plainly state the above as fact, for 'Not everyone that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of Heaven...Many will say to me in that day, Lord Lord; have we not prophesied in thy name? and in thy name have we cast out devils? and in thy name done many wonderful works? And then will I profess unto them, I never knew you: depart from me, ye that work iniquity', (Matt.7:21-23).

The above Scripture often pricked me to the heart when I was involved in, and supported, the signs and wonders teaching. While this Scripture could well refer to a wide cross section of professing Christians, it most certainly should strike a warning to those in the current neo-Pentecostal and signs and wonders movement, the leaders especially.

However, I am convinced that one of Satan's more subtle masterpieces today is the easy believism gospel of western evangelism. The ultimate deception could well be that many think they are saved because of an experience or 'decision', and yet they end up in Hell. Biblically, 'tares' are a fact. Could we be building churches made up of tares? When one considers the fact of a documented 80% 'backsliding' rate from modern day evangelism, the above statement must be considered seriously. It is only near harvest time one can most clearly discern between the wheat and the tares. The tares do not bear fruit yet look very similar to the wheat. Biblically there are no such people as fruitless Christians.

It is the burden of my heart to warn of false teachers, false prophets and false christs. We are no less than dogmatic in our exposure of men like Copeland, Hagin Benny Hinn, Howard-Browne, etc. These men are all false teachers and in most cases false prophets. The evidence is *irrefutable*. Countless people have already ignored the warnings and the facts, and are already deluded, perhaps to their eternal shame.

However, again, a more subtle deception is taking place in the ecumenical easy believism 'decisional regeneration' gospel. Millions make 'decisions' at crusades but fall away and bear no fruit. The problem has got to be in the *message* or the *methods*.

If the message (the seed - the gospel) is added to, diluted and thus polluted in any way, then bad roots produce bad or no real fruit. If the methods are worldly or carnal then the message will point to the flesh rather than the spirit. The methods can affect the message. 'The flesh profiteth nothing' but the message of Jesus is 'spirit and *life*', (Jn.6:63).

The History of Ecumenism

The ecumenical movement as we know it today, although it arguably has roots as far back as the tower of Babel, can be clearly traced to 1910 when 1,355 Evangelical Christians gathered together at a missionary conference in Edinburgh. The idea was to take the Gospel to the uttermost parts of the world. However, thereafter it became clear that there were two camps within the movement. The first longed to preach the unadulterated grace of God to lost tribes. The second group thought rather in terms of world peace and brotherhood. By the 1980's, with the influence of the World Council of Churches (WCC), there was an unmistakable emphasis on political and social issues and a distaste for preaching on sin or bold Biblical evangelism.

The word 'ecumenical' means: 'representing the whole Christian world; seeking world-wide unity; world-wide'. This word in fact comes from the Greek 'oikoumenikos' meaning 'of the inhabited earth', (Aust. Oxford Dictionary). Two opposing points need to be stressed here. Firstly, the word 'ecumenical' has to do with an *earthly* thing, ie. 'of the inhabited earth'. Secondly, the Biblical word for church is 'Ecclesia' meaning 'called out ones' - ie. called out of the world and from earthly things. Ecumenism is a man made worldly thing. In contrast, the true 'ecclesia' is a called out group of a *heavenly* nature. Today the modern ecumenical movement is increasingly worldly and inclusive. It therefore must by nature accept the broad road to include many rather than few. This is why the WCC accepts any church that 'professes Christianity', regardless of whether they accept the Bible as the Word of God or whether they accept homosexuality, liberal theologies, modernism, humanism, etc.

The WCC up until the latter part of this century was considered by most evangelical and fundamental churches to be apostate and even to be the work of the antichrist in building the prophesied end-time church to come. Yet today, one by one, denominations and evangelical leaders are accepting the WCC and the ecumenical movement!

A look at history will show the apostasy of the ecumenical

1947: First world Pentecostal Conference where the 'father of Pentecostalism', David Du Plessis, was introduced. This conference advanced the idea of worldwide unity. Yet in previous years the church leaders fought strongly against new Pentecostal doctrines. However, by the 1950's the barriers had been steadily broken down as Charismatism infiltrated mainline churches.

1950's: The *Latter Rain* teachings began to take root when false prophet William Branham brought this heresy to the USA under a new name: *The Manifest Sons of God*. It penetrated the Assemblies of God but they finally rejected it as heresy.

The Full Gospel Business Fellowship Hosted a World Convention of Pentecostals in Orlando, Florida, where they agreed to 'putting aside...little doctrinal points'. Catholic keynote speaker was Father James Bertalucci, who said: '...When the sleeping giant of Rome comes alive, watch out world...especially in a day and age where we can co-operate and collaborate in winning the world for Jesus Christ.'

1960: Episcopal (Anglican) Dennis Bennet experienced the Charismatic gift of the 'Baptism in the Holy Spirit and tongues' and the experience spread quickly throughout Episcopalian, Methodist, Presbyterian, Baptist and Lutheran denominations.

1966: The Pope accepted the 'Charismatic renewal' in the Catholic Church. Father Edward O'Connor wrote in his book ('The Pentecostal Movement'): 'The new Pentecostal fire has likewise leaped from person to person, and thus has gone across the country.' The common experience uniting Catholics and Protestants was unknown tongues and this caused

many to accept each other as brothers and sisters in Christ for the first time.

1970's: Dr. Billy Graham received the Catholic International Franciscan award for 'his contribution to true ecumenism.'

Kathryn Kulman and other leaders began to meet with the Pope. Crusades and conferences continued with Catholic and Protestant speakers joining hands.

1973: Bill Bright promoted Key 73 Evangelism in which Catholics, ecumenists and Evangelicals were brought together as one. Dr. Billy Graham in this crusade recommended Roman Catholic literature and a biography of the Pope as a 'classic devotion', (which included Saint worship, Marian devotion, sacraments, etc.).

1976: David Du Plessis received the *Pax Christi award* by the Catholic Church.

1977: The Kansas City Charismatic Conference was held. This ecumenical conference featured Pentecostals, Charismatics, Catholics, Assemblies of God, Episcopalians, Lutherans, Presbyterians, Southern Baptists and others. For the first time classical Pentecostals, neo-Pentecostals and Catholic Pentecostals were brought together.

1979: On live TV Billy Graham publicly welcomed the Pope to America and praised him as a great 'spiritual leader.'

1980's: 15,000 participate in the first *March For Jesus* in the UK. These marches became a catalyst in breaking down doctrinal barriers between Catholic and Protestant.

The Trinity Broadcasting Network saw Paul Crouch teaching *Latter Rain* heresies as well as promoting ecumenism and Charismatic faith healers.

1986: Jay Gary introduces the idea of reaching the world by 2000, which included Roman Catholic participation. There was a huge response from many denominations. The AD 2000 committee was set up with Jay Gary as director.

1986-88: Coalition on Revival Congress (1986); North American Congress on the Holy Spirit (1987): Father Tom Forrest (Catholic) was one of the main speakers. A booklet was distributed with plans that included Catholics evangelising the world by 2000. In 1988 Bill Bright planned for 'New Life 2000' which brought together major denominations and para-church groups to set goals to reach the world by 2000.

1990: Ecumenical *Promise Keepers* began. The ecumenical 1994 *Catholics & Evangelicals Together* document was signed by Roman Catholics and several leading evangelical leaders. This document stated Roman Catholicism as Christian and agreed not to evangelise each other but rather to work together.

1991: Billy Graham praises the World Council of Churches.

It is not hard to see the connection between Pentecostalism, Roman Catholicism and shared experiences. The acceptance of Roman Catholicism is the trade mark of the ecumenical movement. However, the swing has not come from the Roman Catholic church but from the evangelical church!

The ecumenical movement which is rapidly bringing churches together has all the hall marks of love but it lacks truth. Many that have joined it have forsaken the essentials of salvation, the authority of Scripture, and the reformation principles that many gave their lives for at the hands of the Roman Catholic Church. Ecumenical love sacrifices Biblical truth on the altar of church unity. This movement is the open door of compromise for New Age ideas and false doctrine.

By all means we should have fellowship with any Christians who share the same Biblical beliefs. However, Jesus never sought to find common ground with the religious leaders of the day. The ecumenical movement and it's leaders are selling out 'the faith once delivered to the saints'! Terry Arnold.

'Commitment'?

As we have written before (*Diakrisis*, 4/97), beware the wisdom of Dr. Robert McQuillan, D.Litt. D.Min (Can), M.Min. MA. BB.th., National Publications Director, Assemblies of God and Editor of their *Evangel* magazine.

In the October 1998 edition his editorial is titled 'Commitment'. We are told of three young men who came out of obscurity in 1945 and onto the worldwide Christian scene. One was considered the most gifted young preacher in the world and it was thought that he could be the greatest evangelist in history. Five years later he apparently left the ministry, renouncing Christ. The second was reckoned the most talented and powerful speaker of the three. He was even offered the lead role in the 'Robe'. Within five years he had deserted his wife and three children, become an alcoholic, and had died at age 35.

The third evangelist was thought of as the least talented of the three, and whereas the world has long forgotten the other two, 'this man is an international figure commanding respect everywhere, still faithfully and fruitfully serving God. His name is Billy Graham.'

Is this correct? Billy Graham now boldly asserts that Christian salvation is not solely through the shed blood of Christ and that universalism is now a part of his belief system. If that is so, then what god is he faithfully and fruitfully serving? You see, people read these articles written by men

who should know better, and they are believed to be the truth. But they are not.

Worse, in a 1998 rally held in Ottawa, Canada, Billy spoke to over 27,000 people. Roman Catholics were the largest group represented (60 churches). That is the highest ever Roman Catholic participation in any Graham crusade. Apparently 9,000 people trusted Christ as Saviour during the meetings.

That's great news, isn't it? Roman Catholics hearing the true Gospel from the lips of Billy Graham? Oh! if only that were true! Roman Catholic counsellors are at the ready to nurture true believers at the end of each session and to direct them to an appropriate local Roman Catholic Church. We can safely conclude that they will not be sent to the 'separated brethren'! (Christians outside the Roman Church). And why should they? The very man they just heard preaching to them plainly asserts: 'Pope John Paul II is one of the greatest moral and spiritual leaders of this century'. In a book just released containing a 1993 interview of Billy by David Frost, the evangelist says: '...that's why it's so important for us to have prayer groups and prayer meetings and join hands together, whether we're Protestants, Catholics or Jews, and pray, because we're praying to the same God'.

If that is Christian commitment, Dr. McQuillan has lost me! Mike Claydon

The Filling With The Spirit

The Baptism with the Spirit is mentioned as placing a person in Christ and into the Body, (1Cor.12:13; Gal.3:27,28). When this occurs, the Bible says: '...the spirit of God dwells in you. Now if any man has not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of him', (Rom.8:9). We either have the Holy Spirit or we do not! As Christians, nowhere in Scripture are we commanded to be Baptised with the Spirit, but in Ephesians 5:18 we are commanded to 'be filled with the Spirit'.

In this Scripture there is a stark contrast shown between being out of control and 'drunk with wine', and in control and 'filled with the Spirit'. Christians are to be controlled by the Holy Spirit. Part of the fruit of the Holy Spirit given to us is self control, (KJV, Gal. 5:22: 'temperance').

The tense of the verb 'be filled' ('pleroo') in Ephesians 5:18 is the present imperative - a continuous ongoing control. It is also used as 'sorrow has filled your heart' in Jn.16:60 - meaning to take possession of. The equivalent noun 'pleres' is used in Lk.4:1; Acts 6:3,5,7:55; 9:17; 11:24 meaning a controlling of. Most commentators believe the verb 'filled' specifically refers to a controlling by the Holy Spirit. To fill means 'control'. If we say someone is filled with joy or anger it means that emotion controls and dominates them. Similarly the phrases 'full of the Holy Spirit' and 'filled with the Holy Spirit' use the verb 'plimplemi' as used in Luke 1:15,41,67; Acts 2:4; 4:8,31; 13:9. It is also used in 'filled with fear', (Lk.5:26). The use of this verb has the meaning of a possession of mind and heart.

In Ephesians 5:18 The phrase 'be filled with the Spirit' does not refer to an outside filling but a controlling by the Holy Spirit already from within. A loose translation of this passage would be, 'Do not be controlled with wine, but instead be controlled by the Holy Spirit'.

It is not us having more of the Holy Spirit but rather the Holy Spirit having more of us! Todays neo-Pentecostal theology reverses this to be a force from without coming onto or into a person. This is much closer to the occult than many realise!

Many Christians are today confused as to the work of the Holy Spirit in the believers life. Signs and wonders leaders teach an impartation theology whereby the Holy Spirit comes 'upon' a believer. They confuse the Old Testament with the New Testament.

In the Old Testament the Spirit came 'upon' Gods servants and often left them. Some people had the Holy Spirit come upon them and leave several times as in the case of Samuel and Sampson. However in the New Testament the Holy Spirit was to come and indwell all believers. In John 7:39 we read '...for the Holy Spirit was not yet given...' and then in John 14:17: 'He dwelleth with you, and shall be in you'. In the latter verse we have the difference between the Old and the New Testament working of the Holy Spirit.

In Acts 2, 8, 11, 19 we see the Holy Spirit comes upon believers for the first time but then thereafter *indwells* them. The reader might ask why the duplication in chapters 8,11 and 19 after Acts 2. The duplication of the Acts 2 experience in

Regeneration

At regeneration we are given God's life, His righteousness, and His nature in us, and we are made a part of His family. Regeneration is not a process but an instantaneous act of God. We have no part in regeneration - it is an act of God in response to faith through His grace. Regeneration follows faith and both are from God. It is an external act of God as is justification. It is not experiential and has nothing to do with feelings or any experience. Such is the grace of God. Terry Arnold

Acts 8,11,19 was to prove that the Samaritans, Romans and Greeks were also included in this new plan of God. Thereafter the Holy Spirit does not come 'upon' believers but rather *indwells*. No epistle ever mentions again the need for us to be baptised in the Spirit or to repeat the Pentecost experience.

Some may quote Acts 19:2: 'Have ye received the Holy Spirit since ye believed? And they said unto him, we have not so much as heard whether there be any Holy Spirit.' Some people use this Scripture for a second experience and the Holy Spirit coming 'upon' them again. However, the original Greek translation is: 'Did you receive the Spirit when you believed'? This occurrence was a special case where the Jews had come into salvation only under the old law and needed to receive the Holy Spirit to be saved under the new covenant. They simply did not have the Holy Spirit as yet.

It is unscriptural to expect a repeat of Pentecost in that the Holy Spirit must come *upon* believers who *already are indwelt by the Holy Spirit*! We either have the Holy Spirit or we do not, (Rom.8:9). Some commentators have suggested that to ask for the Spirit to fall upon us again is at the best against the nature and work of the Holy Spirit and at the worst grieves and denies the indwelling Holy Spirit's work. Do we expect another Calvary, (as in the Roman Catholic 'same and continuing sacrifice')? The book of Acts portrays the promised coming of the Holy Spirit once and for all after Jesus left. It marks the birth of the Church.

Some say we receive 'one baptism and many fillings'. Strictly speaking we should perhaps say, 'one baptism and his constant control'. How can we ensure being filled (controlled) by the Spirit? We must repent of sin in our lives and call it for what it is - sin. 'If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness', (1Jn.1:9). We must yield to the will of the Spirit as we empty ourselves of selfish things and self will. We should reckon ourselves dead to sin, (Rom.6:11). In Ephesians 5:18 the Passive voice is used in the Greek - meaning this filling is not something we are to do but rather something we are to allow to be done in us! Filling is something we are to receive.

Sanctification occurs as we are separated to God and from the world and sin. Wrong behaviour patterns will be dealt with as we surrender to the working of the Holy Spirit within. In Colossians 3 Paul lists attitudes and behaviour patterns that we ought to be rid of. However, true sanctification is not just outward changes in behaviour but rather a working by the Holy Spirit within conforming us to the image of Christ.

The Holy Spirit no longer comes upon us but now dwells in us as believers. We are the 'temple of the Holy Spirit'. He controls us (fills us from within) as we look to Christ and His Word. We dare not 'grieve the Holy Spirit' but rather surrender to His working in us. The Holy Spirit fills us continuously and prepares us for that momentous event when we will see the Lord Jesus Christ face to face in all His glory!

'Good Time Religion'?

The Sunday Mail, 5/7/98 featured an article entitled 'Hallelujah! Good Time Religion On The Rise'. This article depicted the way the secular journalists see todays church:

'The infectious base line brings the room to its feet. Hands clap. Feet start shifting. Back up singers wearing loud shirts sway in unison. The shifting feet start toe tapping...The beaming frontman starts performing actions to the words...the base line gets faster, the singing louder...No longer content with toe-tapping, the frontman starts jumping on the spot and gestures to the crowd to mimic him. They follow. The five piece band brings the song to a close with a crash of cymbals and drums...[with] cheering from the audience...electric guitars and drum kits...Pentecostal churches are on the rise...attracting young people to the church...

... Fifty four percent of Pentecostal church attenders are aged between 15 and 40. This compares to 24% for the Anglican Church and 20% for the Uniting Church... Stephan Kennedy [Liberty Assembly Of God, Brisbane] says: 'I don't care if you're Uniting Church, Anglican, Catholic, Baptist. If you know the name of Jesus and you believe in the Word of God then you are my brother'... And if any one wants to speak out against that, I'd be happy to give them their teeth for lunch'...

Redhead [an Anglican minister] says the Pentecostal churches are a more popular choice with young people because their absolutist views provide the 'instant gratification' that generation X craves. 'They want it all and they want it now'...'Its like the fast food of religious experiences'...a guest Evangelical [at Liberty AOG] tells the congregation what God is saying. 'Put your dollars behind the Gospel...if you want to win the world for Christ you'd better get a budget'...The pressure builds as the audience is told if they do not give a generous donation they will be 'freeloading'...Finally the evangelist asks the congregation to hold the money up in the air so that God can bless it.

...Toronto Blessing...phenomenon...the most disturbing being some animal sounds - barking like a dog, clucking like a chicken, roaring like a lion, and so on...The Toronto Blessing has had positive outcomes for his [Kennedy's AOG] church. 'We added 200 people to our church...our budget was up \$100,000 and we paid \$100,000 off our total mortgage, Kennedy says'.

Editors Comments: It is interesting to see how the secular world correctly sees the church. 'The Children of this world are in this generation wiser than the children of light', (Lk.16:8).

Revival Or Deception?

What are the signs of the end-times? Is it revival or deception? How often do we hear today that there is revival here or there and that there is the big one to come? How often do we hear of signs and wonders? What does the Bible say?

The Bible clearly refers to all signs and wonders in the end times to be *LYING* signs and wonders, (Matt.24:24; 2Thess.2:9; 2Pet.2; Rev.). The Bible also clearly points to deception, not revival, in the end, (Matt.24: 4,5,11,23,24; 2Thess.2:3; etc). Don't be deluded! **Terry Arnold**

Behind The 'March For Jesus'

One of the founders of the *March for Jesus*, Gerald Coates, denies the inerrancy or sufficiency of Scripture. He says, 'it is no more the primary purpose of the church to teach the Scriptures than it is for British Rail to promote timetables'. All four founders (Gerald Coates, Roger Forster, Lynn Green and Graham Kendrick) view the 'Toronto Blessing' and the 'Pensacola outpouring' as moves of God and new moves of the Holy Spirit. Coates and Forster endorse such heretics as Clark Pinnock who denies the omnipotence and omniscience of God and believes that evil could prevail in the end. Coates believes that an infilling of the Holy Spirit can come before conversion. He is a false prophet: He prophesied a major revival at Westminster Chapel and that there would be an earthquake at Lake Taupo in NZ in 1991. Both failed. With the former, numbers declined and the latter did not come to pass.

Forster teaches a form of *Latter Rain* teaching which produced false teaching and failed prophecies decades ago and from which the Assembly of God in USA formerly separated. Lynn Green promotes ecumenism involving major false religions.

The March For Jesus is not a march with other Christians but a mixture of other faiths, including Roman Catholicism.

Toronto or New Age - Whats the Difference?

'Either the rash of end-time prophets and our signs and wonders friends are right, or the Scriptures are -both cannot be.' ('Signs & Wonders - Exposed', P.109)

To Judge or Not To Judge?

How should a Christian keep the Sabbath, Christmas, Easter, etc? What should a Christian eat or drink?

I have heard many Christians judge and even attack other Christians as to what day they keep as the Sabbath, how they keep it, and what their beliefs are on such things as Christmas, Easter and in food and drink. I have noted in recent years that there is much variation among Christians and their beliefs as to how one should keep Christmas, Easter and whether Christians should keep them at all.

I personally have beliefs and convictions about the Sabbath, Christmas, Easter, and food and drink. Not all my beliefs are shared by my friends and family. I believe in freely sharing those views in love when asked by open minded persons.

However, I am continually reminded and prompted by the Scripture: 'One man esteemeth one day above another; another esteemeth every day alike. Let every man be fully persuaded in his own mind. He that regardeth the day regardeth it unto the Lord; and he that regardeth not the day, to the Lord he does not regard it', (Rom.14:5,6). We also need to be aware that many may not have knowledge concerning these days and customs.

Whatever our own convictions are on these things we should follow as the Lord leads. However, in doing this it is wise not to judge others in these things: 'Let no man therefore judge you in meat or in drink or in respect of an holy day, or of the new moon, or of the Sabbath days', (Col 2:16). Pragmatism

Today, when speaking of some controversial practice in evangelism, or a phenomena, or a sign and wonder, the cry is: 'Isn't it worth it all if even just one gets saved and comes to the Lord?... What about those that get saved?'

My first response is: are they really being saved and what about the ones that 'backslide'? When my children and I were once involved in *Youth Alive*, I had the same pragmatic thoughts, until I questioned the worldly presentation, the lifestyle of the leaders, the carnality, the fleshly display of music, the 'Christian rock' bands, the ecstatic worship that appealed to the flesh, and especially the hyped up 'decisions'. For example, rock music is a proven poison of which there is no antidote except to renounce it, repent, and separate. Why Christianise it or mix it with the presentation of the Gospel? Years later I looked closely at some of those who had made 'decisions' for Christ and found almost all had 'backslidden' and gone back into the world.

Similarly with many of the crusades today, unbelievers are told that if they invite Jesus into their hearts, accept Him as personal Saviour, believe the facts of the Gospel or walk the aisle and say a 'sinners prayer' that they will be saved.

Should we praise God for those few sovereignly saved through such easy believism, yet not ask why the majority fell away? If I fed poison to 1,000 people and some survived would that make the poison worth it?

Western evangelism has an 80% 'backsliding' rate. Many look at the 20% as proof of success in their use of modern methods. Western evangelism is fast becoming a 'love joy peace' Gospel that fails to preach sin and the law and its consequences. To this are added attractions to make the Gospel more palatable to the unsaved. These include the emphasis on making a 'decision', aisle-walking, gimmicks, pitches, emotional manipulation (often through music), and even intimidation. The result is a mixed, impure and diluted message. Who knows how many people are deluded into believing they are saved when they are not?

Results do not prove truth. If a person gets saved while in a false religion, do we endorse the false religion? Such pragmatism would seem ridiculous enough. Yet today when it comes to western evangelism and its fruit such pragmatism is common. I care about the 80% of who many might think are on their way to heaven yet might hear those terrible words of Jesus: 'I never knew you; depart from me ye that work iniquity', (Matt.7:21-23). Book Review

'Just As I Am' by Billy Graham

'God loves us. He yearns to forgive us and bring us back to Himself. He wants to fill our lives with meaning and purpose right now...Moreover God gas done everything possible to reconcile us to Himself...In God's plan by His death on the cross, Jesus Christ paid the penalty for our sins...Now God freely offers us the gift of forgiveness and eternal life...God has done everything possible to provide salvation. But we must reach out in faith and accept it...' (PP.727-728).

This is Billy Graham's Gospel - Jesus has done His bit, now you do yours. This 'Gospel' has run swiftly in the earth. It has been well received, not only by many who call themselves Evangelicals, but also by liberals, Roman Catholics, Orthodox and many others...As Rose Kennedy...said to Graham, 'You know I often listen to you. Even though we are Catholics, I have never heard you say anything we don't agree with in the Bible.' (P.401)...

There can be no doubt that God, in sovereign mercy, has been pleased to truly save many sinners through Billy Graham's ministry. We know that God can use whatever instrument he pleases to perform His sovereign will. However, in the wake of Graham's ministry there is much spiritual wreckage. There are undoubtedly many thousands around the world who feel that they are 'born again' and on the road to eternal glory because they made their 'decision' at a Billy Graham rally. We find them everywhere armed with their 'testimony' and waving their decision cards, yet their life is evidence that there has been no true work of grace. Many no longer attend any church and live in sin and corruption, but they still believe they are 'saved' because they made their decision. This is the Devil's tool and he knows how to use it. Why then would he oppose such evangelistic methods as those used by Billy Graham?

...Billy Graham...has never separated from those who have embraced sacramentalism as a way of salvation. He has prayed with Roman Catholics and Eastern Orthodox, shared platforms with their Bishops, exchanged pleasantries with the Pope. His one policy has been 'to let the Catholic Bishops see that my gospel was not to get people to leave their church, rather I wanted them to commit their lives to Christ.' (P.163)...

What we learn from this autobiography is that preaching the message which the world wants to hear can bring fame and honour beyond imagination to those gifted enough to do it well, but preaching the Gospel faithfully is profoundly theological and profoundly unpopular. The tragedy is that this autobiography only teaches us the latter by negative example'.

Lovers of Truth?

We are outraged when investigative journalism uncovers hidden truth or when the truth is subverted. We approve of investigation that uncovers political corruption or fraud. We see this often in the media. But what about within the church? Instead we say 'Don't judge!'

Longsuffering

'He allowed His own creatures to pluck His hair and spit in His face. Such patience should be yours as servants of God. We are to be willing to be made nothing of, and even to be counted as the offscouring of all things. It is pitiful for the Christian to refuse to suffer, and to become a fighting man, crying, 'We must stand up for our rights'. Did you ever see Jesus in that posture?...'

Dear TA: Re: 'Impartation theology.' [see Diakrisis July] Your thesis seems to be as follows - the Holy Spirit now takes up residence within us! No argument with that.

[Qs.1] Apparently it follows in your mind that - therefore the Holy Spirit does not, will not or cannot 'come upon' people today. I mean as well as indwelt - both at the same time! Any Scripture?

[Qs.2] Perhaps you are suggesting that the Holy Spirit cannot get past the 'powers of the air' (2nd paragraph July vol. 1 No.29), Yours in Christ Jesus, (P.S., Sydney)

Editors reply: Dear ...[Qs.1] What does Scripture say? It says nothing! The Scriptures after Acts 2 are silent about the Holy Spirit coming upon any believers. Once a person is indwelt with the Holy Spirit the Holy Spirit never comes 'upon' them again! Why would He? He already indwells them! Any 'filling' (eg. Eph.5:18) - is from within and a controlling of the person by the Holy Spirit. This was the orthodox Biblical teaching for 1,900 years until some in the Pentecostal and Charismatic movements began to practise a form of impartation theology which early Pentecostals actually stood against. It could well be close to blasphemy to dole out the person of the Holy Spirit from outside into a person.

I am saying what the Scripture says. To say that the Holy Spirit comes upon believers from outside to inside is contradictory to the work of the Holy Spirit; is not in Scripture; and is therefore extra-Biblical. We are told not to go 'beyond the Word of the Lord', (Nu.22:18). If we do, we may well open ourselves up to alien spirits who many believe can be received from outside. Many in the Toronto and Pensacola 'revivals' have found this out after many years of anguish and shipwreck.

[Qs.2] There is no suggestion that 'the Holy Spirit cannot get past the 'powers of the air''. This is not in question and has nothing to do with the article on impartation in July, Vol.1, No.29.

In short there simply is no Scripture showing the Holy Spirit coming 'upon' believers after Acts 2. Many today believe that the practise of imparting the Holy Spirit and the 'anointing' is at best titillating the flesh, and at worst trafficking in demons.

...I urge you to continue to test the spirits. I am encouraged that you are challenging me - it means you are testing things and studying. We will not be judged by what I write but by the Word of God, (Jn.12:48). Thanking you. Yours in His Truth,

The Finances of the Mormon Church

'Its current assets total a minimum of \$30 billion. If it were a corporation, its estimated \$5.9 billion in annual gross income would place it midway through the FORTUNE 500, a little below Union Carbide and the Paine Webber group but bigger than Nike and the Gap...The top beef ranch in the world is not the king ranch in Texas. It is the Deseret Cattle & Citrus ranch outside Orlando,...its value as real estate alone is estimated at \$858 million. It is owned entirely by the Mormons. The largest producer of nuts in America, Agreserves, inc...is Mormon owned. So are the Bonneville International Corp., the country's fourteenth largest radio chain, and the Beneficial Life insurance Co., with assets of \$1.6 billion...There is no major church in the US as active as the Latter Day Saints in economic life, nor per capita, as successful at it....[The Mormons] impose a compulsory 10% income tax on their members. Tithes are collected locally...There is a lot to deposit. Last year \$5.2 billion in tithes flowed into Salt lake City...The Latter Day Saints employ vast amounts of money in investments that Time estimates to be at least \$6 billion strong...most of this money...is invested directly in church owned [affairs] for profit concerns...The church owns 16 radio stations and one TV station...' (Time Aug, 1997)
